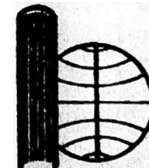

## Introduction

“There is but a work for men, to snatch something however small it may be, from destruction and oblivion”.—Georges DUHAMEL.

“The matter unfolds the whole energy of its active powers only in an atomic state, imponderable, so to say immaterial (as for example the vapors, the gas, the calories, the electricity etc.); nothing is more logical and more rational but the atomicity, the invisibility, the imponderability, the infinitisimality of doses. Does it not seem necessary that the medicinal power is in direct relation with the vital force; and if the latter is wanting essentially in the qualities proper to the matter, the gravity and the expansiveness, the latter should it not be despoiled of these two properties to reinvest them with analogous and proportional to that of the mysterious agent which it should modify?”

The homoeopathic preparation of any medicinal substance seems to liberate from the substance really all the atomic forces and extracts out of it the essence so to say. The present work bears witness to this fact, and that witness is true.

Homoeopathy is a therapeutic means which uses in small doses the remedies capable of causing in healthy man in strong doses, some symptoms analogous to those that are presented by the patient.

All medicinal substance provoke always some psychic and somatic symptoms.

Dr. J.P. Gallavardin devoted a portion of his life in the research of psychic manifestations of these remedies.

In the first part of this publication "*Psychism and Homoeopathy*"\*, are to be found:

1. A first chapter partially historic showing the use of medicinal substances for modifying and provoking a psychic effect from the "antidote of anger and of grief" of the Egyptians, of Helena putting in the wine, that Telemac was drinking, the drug which makes to forget all ills; "the mandragora of Hippocrates for curing the sadness leading to suicide"; the medicine, agent of moral and intellectual culture of Galen", the philtres for evoking love and extinguishing it etc....the wine, the coff e, the tea of our days.

To these effects, always primitive, of these medicines, Hahnemann opposes their secondary effects and their durations of action : the sadness of *Ignatia*, the melancholy of *Aurum*, etc. Dr. J.P. Gallavardin demonstrates later on the utility of *Nux* and of *Hepar sulphuris* against the anger concurrently with many other remedies, following the individual indications of the 200th and 10,000th dilutions.

2. There is afterwards a short chapter on Hahnemann and the two motives for which he has not utilised the very numerous psychic properties of medicines discovered by him:

- (a) Defect of convenient doses.
- (b) The ignorance of the value and the justification of psychic symptoms.

Explanation of these two motives.

3. A chapter devoted to the psychic observations of Charles Dulac.

4. How the Homoeopathic treatment may ameliorate the character and develop the intelligence of man, 1882.

11. 64 Pathogeneses of the mind of homoeopathic medicines found amongst the manuscripts.

It is a posthumous work, the text of it is completely taken out of the notes and manuscripts without any addition from the outside, unpublished in its principal "The Repertory of Psychic Medicine".

The medicinal substances indicated in these pages are for the greater part, some substances prepared and dynamised according to the Korsakovian method.

My intention was at first to publish only the Repertory of medicines capable to modify our psychic behaviour.

It is in fact the POLE of this work, the AXIS of the other chapters which are but their demonstrations, and their observations, the proof of their experimental truth.

Dr. J.P. Gallavardin had always reserved, inspite of many requests for them made in France and in foreign land and did not give out but that which in their results might concern the public and private moralisation (See the preface of the chap. VII, "Treatment of the genital passions" included in part one).

My brother, Dr. Jules Gallavardin, during his short life as an apostle of homoeopathy, had not the leisure to assure the divulgation of it.

After a life devoted to a quite different activity, it is upon repeated requests more and more pressing that I open to-day the 'MEDICAL TESTAMENT' of Dr. Jean-Pierre Gallavardin.



The aim of this publication is to group, in two volumes everything that may—the work of Dr. J.P. Gallavardin—have relation to the psychic treatment of all the human tendencies, in a word to edify a compendium of all his researches and realisations.

## CHAPTER 1

### PLASTIC MEDICINE

Here is a new science that I have been brought to study and apply accidentally since 18 years, almost at the same time with that of psychic medicine. While applying psychic medicines, I have found without searching for them, some plastic medicines.

After the plastic arts that we owe to painters, to sculptors, we have the plastic surgery which gives shapes to the nose, to the face, to a limb and which we owe to allopathy. Then we have the plastic medicine which we owe to Homoeopathy.

At the first approach, it would seem unlikely that by the help of remedies, some parts of the body as regards their formations and colour, can be modified. But it would seem likely when I give the following physiological explanations:

In order to obtain the above results, one should search for, by pathogenic experiments on healthy man or clinically on patients the medicines having an elective action on such and such parts of the body which are to be modified.

If one of the remedies increases the nutrition of such and such part it will increase its plumpness and by bringing the repletion of tissues, it will cause to disappear the folds and the wrinkles. If an other remedy diminishes the nutrition of such and such part, it will diminish its plumpness.

Thus you will find medicines of which one will increase the growth of such and such part of the body and the other that will make thinner the same part.

The first of these remedies, by causing the flow of blood in that part will give colour more or less rosy to that part.

The second, by causing the diminution of the flow of blood in that part of the body will bring about certain paleness.

With some appropriate remedies therefore, one may increase the plumpness and the colour of such and such part of the body and with some other obesity and colour of those parts may be diminished.

Every homoeopathic doctor may find some plastic remedies, if, like me, they observe attentively the effects produced by a single dose of a remedy in 200 dilution and that it is let to act for 3, 5 or 8 weeks.

For this need, the women specially who are very much interested in observation on themselves and on their children and husbands, will help the doctors who are interested in the plastic medicine. In the plastic treatment these doctors will be successful at first only in 30% of cases, then in the long run they will be successful in more than 50% of cases.

They will be able thus to contribute to the harmony in a family and to conjugal morality. In fact, the woman becoming old earlier than her husband, when the latter has no sense of duty towards his wife, leaves her who has lost her plastic charm, one would be able to a certain extent variable according to individuals prolong their youthfulness.

Besides the plastic medicine, far from destroying their health, will preserve it, ameliorate it and thus contribute to the longevity under the best conditions.

After having described the physiological mechanisms according to which is operated the plastic cures, I am going to report some cases:

#### Case 1

##### **Breasts almost disappeared**

About 18 years ago, a young woman came to me to consult for a gland which she had under the chin. When she came to me for the second time she informed me that my 1st medicine has given no effect and told me besides that her breasts have almost disappeared when the gland appeared. I told her: "I am going to give you a remedy which will cause to disappear the gland and your breasts will appear again. This double effect was in fact produced by *Iodium 200*."

#### Case 2

##### **Breasts disappeared**

A woman came to tell me : "I am 49 years old, widow and asked in marriage, but I do not like to say yes, before you can bring back my breasts which have completely disappeared". I asked her who had sent you to me? She replied, Mme X.... whom you have done the same thing for which I have come to you. *Staphysagria 200* or *Iodium 200*.

#### Case 3

##### **Breasts not developed**

One of my patients asked me to treat free a young cutter of 19 years, suffering from chlorotic anemia. I gave her 3 doses of *Ignatia 200*. Sometimes afterwards, my client said to me: "In two months your remedy has caused to appear in that young girl, breasts which she never had".

I came to know a plastic medicine which I didn't know.

#### Case 4

##### **Breasts not developed**

A beautiful brunette of 24, professor of music came to ask me some remedies for developing her memory for musical compositions. I gave her two remedies of which *Staphysagria 200*, which seemed to act, then a third which acted much more effectively. I told her to note carefully the action of the third remedy *Graphitis 600* which will probably bring some change over her body. A few weeks afterwards, she informed me that in two months, her breasts which she never had, developed. She had in fact perfectly modelled breasts like that of a statue. Two months afterwards she complained that her breasts are too hard. Have you ever seen a woman, who in her perfect health, has complained of hard breasts? I gave a fourth remedy which made her breasts less hard but very firm. She had not the need of wearing bras.

Accidentally I found again a new remedy.

**Case 5****Shoulders and buttocks very large.****Breasts very small**

A woman writes me from Paris asking me for a remedy for diminishing the largeness of her shoulders and her buttocks that, with the advance of age have become larger. I sent her a few globules of 200 in my letter. Four weeks afterwards she informs me that her shoulders and hips have become thinner and that her breasts have become bigger. *Calcarea carbonica-200*.

**Case 6****Breasts disappeared.****Skeletal thinners of the neck**

Hips excessively big. Skin of the neck black. Red patches on cheeks. A young girl of 28, since an unfortunate marriage at the age of 22 her breasts have completely disappeared, her thorax became as thin as a skeleton and as if by compensation her hips became abnormally large. The skin of her neck has become black and on each of her cheeks there are big red patches.

She came to consult me for an ozena, a sequale after an attack of diphtheria.

She took the 3rd dilution 2, 3 or 4 times a day during one week then no medicine for a week; then medicine another week and so on alternately for three months. At the end of this period. the ozena was cured, the skin of the neck became white; cheeks have no more red patches, but rosy, the plumpness of the thorax and breasts became as they were before six years. The enormous hips became normal. *Mercurius cyanatum*.

**Case 7****Deformed breasts after feeding or after delivery**

Nine out of ten women have deformed breasts after feeding the child or after delivery. Since 12 years I give them some

medicines that stops the milk within 8 to 12 days and checks the deformation of their breasts. I have even obtained the result in women whose breasts have become deformed after feeding the child. I may affirm that up till now I have been successful with *Pulsatilla*, *Bryonia*, *Belladonna*, *Mercurius vivus*.

**Case 8****Breasts too big**

A religious woman of 38 years. She was so much obese that she could not teach in her school. Her weight in 3 months became 20 kg. I put on her tongue 8 to 10 globules of *Nux vomica 200*. I told her that her breast will also become smaller in volume. Five weeks later she admitted in fact that her breasts have become two-third of their former largeness and all that at the same time when her health became good.

**Case 9****Very great development of cheeks,  
breasts and of the structure.****Limbs very thin**

A brunette, big, prayed me to cure a dyspepsia. Three times I gave her on her tongue some globules of 200 dilution of *Nux vomica* at an interval of 4 to 5 weeks. Then I found the following results: Cure of the dyspepsia; the stature became less big, round and long, the breasts became smaller and firm. Instead of a big round body she had a slim and long one and the most unexpected was that her limbs became more plump. I found thus a remarkably useful plastic remedy.

**Case 10****Neck very short and very big.****Enormous double chin**

A woman, short, thick set, nevertheless elegant, because very straight. I put on her tongue some globules of 200 dilution that transformed her neck into a long one which was apoplectic.

At the age of 60 years, she came to my house with a

double chin, the two chins were separated by a deep furrow of about one centimetre. I put on her tongue some globules of *Nux vom.* 200. Two to three months after the second chin almost disappeared and also the deep furrow which made the double chin hedious.

The result persisted several years.

#### **Case 11**

##### **Enormous cheeks, very red in adolescents and in adults**

The carrier of such cheeks got from me 6 to 8 globules on the tongue of 5,000 dilution of *Sulphur* which gave a longish shape of their faces which were round, and replaced enormous cheeks with rosy cheeks.

I was always successful in such cases.

#### **Case 12**

##### **Obesity of the belly**

In a dark skinned man of high stature, but having a big belly, I used *Nux vomica* 10,000 and cured him of his obesity. In many women, by using *Nux vomica* 200. I cured the obesity of their bellies.

When this obesity is the result of pregnancy and if it is produced by the rupture of the white line, the plastic medicine is powerless. Plastic surgery is to be taken in recourse to if the woman want to have a beautiful form.

#### **Case 13**

Within 2 to 5 months, I have often by the help of medicines developed the whiteness of the skin in young French girls who had up till then a very unhealthy colour. *Mercurius cyanatus* 3.

#### **Case 14**

##### **Ridges under the eyes**

A young beautiful woman lost partly the glaze of her

beautiful skin after pregnancy and feeding her breasts and besides there were formed under her eyes' ridges which were vulgarly called goose flesh because of their radiating forms. After the ingestion of some remedies, the skin got back its glaze and the ridges disappeared. The indication of the remedy was not found.

#### **Case 15**

##### **Eyes surrounded with blue aura**

20 to 25 years ago, I treated during many years a young girl of 38 years, blonde, pale, having the eyes horribly surrounded with blue. I finally found a remedy, and after the using of which, the eyes were no more encircled. That cure astonished me much at that time when I did not know the usefulness of plastic medicine. In the repertory: *Staphysagria*, *China*, *Phosphoric acid*.

I asked Dr. Labrunne, to what class of the society his clients belong. He replied: "From all the classes, persons who begin to feel the sufferings, the infirmities of ripe age and of old age because the public have understood that the homoeopathic treatment allay and cure their sufferings, their infirmities or very often delay indefinitely their due time". I may add that this treatment more or less delays, according to the individual the arrival of sensibility of the bodily, mental, or intellectual.

When it will be understood that the plastic medicine and the psychic medicine check persons from becoming prematurely old in body, character and intelligence, men and above all women will come more and more to Homoeopathy. Thus Homoeopathy will become the common medicine for all.

#### **Other cases**

1. *Graphitis* 600 – **Breasts, tops of the shoulders, calves, fingers, ephelides.**

Mme C.R., 28 years, Hm. gtte. Blotched face. Acne on the nose, lips, chin, cheeks. Constant ephelides during her whole life. Becomes easily angry, not expansive.

1883, 23 April : *Graphitis* 600 – Diminution of the blotched

face, and from the day when she ceased to drink wine, gradual disappearance of ephelides of the face. The 9th October, she has almost no ephelides.

She does not become easily angry. She has become expansive. 9th October: Her breasts, which were practically nothing, are bigger than they were before her marriage and her pregnancy, but moderate.

The top of the shoulder, which was bony, is fat.

Her calves, up till then very thin, have developed since 3 weeks.

### 2. *Graphitis 600 and 2000* – **Breasts.**

Miss B. 48 years, since the age of 28, fibroma of the matrix, with weakening metrorrhagias.

*Graphitis* has stopped the haemorrhages and decreased the volume of the belly, 0.15 of the circumference.

Her breasts, which were flabby and hanging, have become somewhat voluminous and more firm.

### 3. *Pulsatilla 200* – **Breasts, belly, neck, colour**

Miss F.... beautiful girl of 15 years, looks as if of 18 years, neck and belly very big, breasts very small.

*Pulsatilla 200* – 6 to 8 globules on the tongue.

One month later, neck and belly diminished and took the normal shape. Breasts become bigger and projecting. The look and the colour, which were tern, became bright.

### 4. *Sodium 300* – **Big neck, small breasts**

Has made to disappear in many women, big neck, goiter, maxillary glands, has made the breasts bigger.

In a woman of 43 years, big, corpulent, deep coloured, it has cured the swelling of the neck and enlarged a little the breasts and made it more firm.

### 5. *Ignatia 200* – **Breasts, hips**

Young girl of 16 years, not yet menstruated. Was cured of a first attack of chlorosis by Oxalate of iron.

*Ignatia 200* developed breasts and hips. After a second attack of chlorosis, against which Oxlate of iron proved useless, *Ignatia 200* was given again without success.

6. M.X. – 53 years, very obese, lymphatic temperament, has tried many remedies to become thinner, but none was effective.

Weight 98 kg. Circumference of the hips 128 cm, circumference of the body 108 cm.

26th July 1896: The patient takes a single dose of *Calcarea carbonica 200*, about 15 globules dry, on the tongue.

21st August: The patient has lost 6.5 kg, circumference of the hips by 0.16 cm, circumference of the body by 0.05 cm.

25th August: Second dose of *Calcarea carbonica 200* taken also once.

6th October: Total result: The patient has lost 12 kg. The circumference of the hips diminished by 0.24 cm, circumference of the body by 0.10 cm. The patient has worked much (intellectually) as the heat was at that time very strong. He has eaten and drunk more than ordinary.

23rd October: 3rd dose of *Calcarea carbonica 200*. 23 Oct., Total result: The patient has lost 15 kg, his circumference of the hips diminished by 0.29 cm, circumference of the body by 0.13 cm.

28th October : Total result : Lost 16 kg. of his weight; circumference of the hips by 0.31 cm., circumference of the body by 0.14 cm.

3rd December: Fourth dose of *Calcarea carbonica 200*.

20th January, 1897: The last dose gives no result. *Calcarea carbonica 6000* was given, a single dose.

19th February: Condition same as before. *Sulphur 5000*, one single dose.

1st March: The patient has still lost 0.03 cm of his hips and 0.02 cm of his body circumference. The weight was the same. He was very much surprised.

19th April: *Baryta carbonica 600*, a single dose.

4th May: The patient has lost still 2 kg., hips by 0.05 cm, body 0.04 cm.

17th June, 1897: *i.e.*, to say 18 months afterwards the patient has lost 18 kg. The circumference of hips has diminished by 0.39 cm and the circumference of the body by 0.19 cm.

No special diet was followed.

The doctor observer who will note the dates of the adminis-

tion of seven doses during the eleven months of the treatment will see that all the doses were given at the beginning of the decreasing moon. I do not think it necessary to delay on this point. While I was occupied with mental and intellectual culture of man I searched for and used the medicines which can contribute to body culture and esthetic culture of man.

These plastic medicines may correct the defects of the different parts of the body which are not of normal shape, or defective because of excessive colouration of the skin.

After the publication in "Medical Advance" some of the results of the psychic medicine and of plastic medicine, a famous publisher proposed to me to buy my work on Plastic medicine. He considered with reason, that if the psychic treatment may prove the utility of Homoeopathy, the Plastic treatment will demonstrate better the double utility. In fact the patients hide their defects of character and intelligence and even when the psychic treatment has cured the defects, they do not say about the cure. The effects of plastic treatment are visible and tangible. If it cures the deformity and defects of man and woman specially, everybody sees the results. Also this treatment proves the utility of the high dilutions of the medicines. This consideration has decided me to publish these few results of the Plastic treatment which may be reproduced at will.

## REPERTORY OF PLASTIC MEDICINE

When one wished to make bigger a part give the remedy during the increasing moon *i.e.* to say the 2nd, 3rd, 4th day after the new moon.

When one wishes to diminish the plumpness of a part, give the remedy during the decreasing moon, *i.e.* to say the 2nd, 3rd, 4th day after the full moon.

During the full moon, generally the weight is 1 to 3 pounds more which is lost during the decreasing moon, and one regains it during the increasing moon.

## ACONITUM NAPELLUS

A character quite opposite to a sober, calm and tranquil one.

Humour changes hour to hour : alternating communicative emotions.

Alternating gay and talkative, sad and morose.

Laughing, dancing, singing, weeping or quarrelsome, angry, making reproaches, contrarated by some trifles. Stubborn, misanthrope, or well disposed, sociable.

Weeping and taking jokes as bad or with great hilarity.

Very much sensitive to the least noise, by music, which brings his nerves on edges and begins to weep.

Afraid of a misfortune, of a nearing death, speaks about it, hopelessness.

Something hoping, sometimes hopeless. Tendency to become afraid.

**Intellect**

Alternating effects.

Great intellectual activity or difficulty to think, to write or to express alternating.

Very strong memory or loss of memory.

Unstable ideas : If he wishes to stick to one idea, a second idea drives it away, then a 3rd and a 4th, finally his head is confused.

Sometimes he is distracted. has hallucinations, has furious

delirium, runs in and out of the room. Sometimes he is quite reasonable.

Tendency to have intuitions, presentiments, the second sight when awake or when asleep. Thus very vivid dream in the morning, in which he finds a solution of a problem, from which he was unable to free himself while awake.

**Pure Indications**

Arterial sanguin temperament in all ages specially children and adolescents.

Often in adult women than in adult men.

Violent impulses alternate. Versatile character. Active, open minded persons, rarely or for a very short time self-centred.

Very great passions, never satisfied because of rapid weakness and loss of force.

Men of common sense (intuitive), but no judgment, is unable to reason, deduce or induce.

Effects of fright or of violent emotions in arterial sanguin persons.

Fear of death, hopelessness.

Very high fever, alternate laughing and weeping without reason; delirium.

Suppression of excretions (menses, lochia, sweat, urine) after violent emotions.

**Clinical Indications**

Fear of death, hopelessness. Sea-sickness plus diseases with fear.

--Synochal fever with delirium. Laughs and weeps (Hermel-Mental derangement, p. 134).

Restlessness (Ars.).

Trembling of hands, insomnia and needs lying down.

Bad humour.

Giddiness with tremblings in the head and as if losing reason.

**Weakness, sadness, melancholy, restlessness, ANXIETY.**

Disposition to weep for nothing.

Tendency to become afraid.

Hopeless in regard to his health, his eternal happiness and tendency to suicide.

**Hypochondria, egoism, indifference.** Horror of solitude.

**Antipathy** without any motive against some persons.

Moroseness and pessimism.

Great *sensitiveness*, irritable, **violent, emotional, hateful, vindictive, egoist** (Dulac).

Intellectual work difficult.

**General fatigue**, caused by intellectual work.

Weak memory, aphasia.

Hallucinations, delirium, fear of losing reason, mental derangement.

**Lypomania**, intellectual and physical inertia.

Hallucinations and suicidal ideas.

Delirium tremens, hallucinations, insomnia (Hempel).

#### Consecutive Symptoms

Many ideas but cannot fix to any one. Loses the knowledge of his personality.

Brain excited with congestion, redness of the head, of the face, of cheeks. Easy and rapid conception.

Gaity and vivacity of the mind.

Hasty, giddiness.

#### Pure Indications

Indicated in children and in women and adults that have the character of a child.

### CAPSICUM ANNUM

Paralytic weakness of intellect, for which he cannot develop clearly his thoughts.

### CARBO VEGETABILIS

Pusillanimity.

Hopelessness with tears, sometimes up to burning his brain.

Feels very unfortunate, desires death.

Oppression, fullness, anxiety.

Fear of ghosts at night.

Excessive gaity with easy change of temperament after meals.

Weak memory and forgets what has just happened.

Slow progress of ideas centred on a single subject. the head as if tightly bound.

Timid.

**Want of self-control.**

Inaptitude to **speak in public.....to rime.**

Not sufficiently eclectic.

Very positive mind.

Discouragement. Hopelessness.

Not sufficiently sensitive to the action of remedies.

Does not react against the action of remedies.

Dislikes fat foods.

Indigestion by fat foods.

Indigestion by cakes, pastries.

### CAUSTICUM

Anxious thoughts day and night.

Gloomy sadness and weeps for the least cause.

Extreme weakness and completely broken down.

DESOLATION (Stannum).

Always thinks about death with restlessness and great anxiety.

Discouragement.

Thinks that he will not be cured (Aurum).

Attack of anxiety, restlessness and great anxiety DURING corporeal sufferings as if in the region of the heart, as if by the apprehension of a misfortune.

Continual anxiety WITH wet skin.

FEAR, ANXIETY, APPREHENSION in every event (Stannum).

Is afraid at night, in the evening with fearful ideas. In the presence of a dog, fear and anxiety up to tremblings.

Every noise in the street makes him afraid by the least occasion; is afraid that others will make him suffer.

DESIRE to live no more out of fear.

• **WANT OF CONFIDENCE IN THE FUTURE.**

Disposition to become afraid.

Dissatisfied with himself, with a gloomy LOOK.

Moroseness with self-centred and stubborn taciturnity.

Sulkiness and badly disposed.

Everything impresses disagreeably.

SADNESS, hypochondriac.

Tendency to become angry, excessively irritated, sometimes indifference to music; weeping disposition.

SUSCEPTIBILITY (Aurum).

Tendency to take everything in the bad light and becomes angry for nothing.

Quarrelsome, egoist, OBSTINATE.

Alternate playfulness, with mental weakness.

Mind as if intoxicated.

Hebetude as if the head is tightly bound or as if by intoxication, with redness of the face (Sepia, Stannum).

VERY SENSITIVE.

Very ardent.

Indifferent.

Easily disturbed (breakable).

Cross.

Quarrelsome.

Not gracious.

Caustic.

Slander.

Opposes and contradicts.

Intolerent.

Not very conservative.

Pessimist.

Liar.

Distrust.

Inaptitude for philosophy and mechanic.

Inconsolable grief.

Extreme solicitude.

Tic of snuffling.

For taking away the habit of tobacco.

Very strong genital impulse, very frequent and even irresistible.

A woman dislikes a man.

### CHAMOMILLA

Excessive anxiety by repeated attack, as if for going to stools, with jactation, restlessness, groanings and hopelessness.

Hebetude and violent, headaches, with exasperation, groanings, sweats.

Speaks and replies only when he is forced, but laconically, reluctantly. He is obstinate to speak a word.

He is seated on a chair, immobile, like a statue and as if seeing nothing around him.

Bad moods, with complaints on insomnia, which cause pains as if bruised in the limbs.

Inspite of everything hypochondriac ideas, which is believed to be caused by constipation and pain in the head.

Believes to be offended.

Scruples of conscience for the least causes.

Speaks continually of past bad happenings.

Tendency to become angry and dispute.

Very much choleric and quarrelsome humour.

Excessive irritation. Excessive sensitiveness of all the senses; the smell, noise, music even are unbearable.

Lamentable cries of children when something which they ask for is refused to them, but when the thing is given they do not want it any more.

Moves the head forward and backward.

### Pure Indications

1. Very much sensitive to pain and its effect on the mind. Therefore one should not use *Chamomilla* in persons who bear pains patiently and with resignation.

2. After offenses, contrarities in those who bear them with difficulty. It should therefore be used in children and in persons who are like children, who bear impatiently the pain, groan and cry and become restless.

3. In irritable persons, of bad humour, morose, taciturn. hypochondriac, disposed to become very angry and quarrel. In wicked children who are very much sensitive to pain and capricious.

4. In persons undecided, meticulous, capricious.

5. After a fright in persons who are easily afraid.

6. In less intelligent persons (or having temporarily difficult understanding).

Hebetude, stupid, idle, apathetic, indifferent, aphasic in normal condition being distracted, hallucination, delirium and catalepsy.

7. In less intelligent persons, apathetic, in a word very little resignation, very sensitive to offences, contrarities, fright, very irritable and subject to anger and quarrelsome.

**Clinical Indications**

Quarrelsome and angry (Jahr).

Tendency to weep and to become angry (Jahr).

Attack of great distress, as if the heart is going to burst, with complete discouragement, excessive anxiety, restlessness and jactation, groans and weeps (Jahr).

**Desire** for solitude.

**Indifference, apathy, repugnance** to conversation.

Desire for running away in a distant place and to live alone so much he believes himself to be an object of pity and disgust for others.

Silent stubbornness, does not want to reply to any question.

Absolute loss of calmness.

Moroseness and dislikes work and meditation and all bodily or mental efforts.

The least fault is formalised strongly, similarly the simple lie of others.

Almost mad tendency to hum and sing.

Thinking fatigues much the head.

**COFFEA**

**Trembles** and cannot hold the pen when writing.

Cries and insomnia of babies.

Desolation and amelioration in open air.

Tendency to weep, irascible and anxious.

Great excitation with agility in all his movements.

Sentimentality and continual ecstasy.

Great peace of mind.

Sagacity in meditations.

Remembers passed events.

**CONIUM MACULATUM**

Sadness, discouragement, think of death.

Weeps and sorry for his condition.

Anxiety with restlessness.

**Hypochondriac** and **weakness** of the mind while **walking** and in open air.

Hysteric attacks sometimes with shivering.

Very small quantity of liqueur makes him drunken.

**Fearful reflexions** on the present and on the future with the desire for solitude.

**Weeping** tendency and discouraged.

Fear of thieves at night, thinks that someone has entered through the door.

Superstitious ideas.

Tendency to become afraid.

He is easily moved and weeps.

Continual bad temper with irascibility and sensation as if he is guilty.

Paralysis of all the limbs.

**Indifference, apathy, ennui.**

Sulky. Everything produces a disagreeable sensation.

Irascibility and discontentment for nothing, sad things are recalled; intolerant, easily angered and excited.

Anthropophobia and at the sametime fear of solitude.

Proximity to the conversation of passers-by is so much repugnant that he would like to maltreat and strike them.

Want of all agreeable **sentiments**.

Insensibility and idleness.

### CROCUS SATIVUS

Melancholic sadness and hypochondriac humour.  
 While occupied in reading interesting things, suddenly becomes sad.  
 Anger and calmness alternate.  
 Striking change of opposite dispositions.  
 Serenity alternating with calmness.  
 Sometimes angry against others, sometimes disposed to embrace them.  
 In the alternation of hardness and softness, the latter seems to be preponderant.  
 A single musical note forces him to sing in spite of contrary resolution.  
 Indifference for everything, dislikes every work.  
 Religious melancholy.

### CROTALUS

Makes mistakes while writing and makes spelling mistakes.  
 Jahr : Quarrelsome (two enemy cats live peacefully after the application of this remedy; excessive vivaciousness, excessively jolly followed by idleness, and somnolence in cats.)

### CUPRUM METALLICUM

Melancholia with anthropophobia.  
 Fears death which he believes very near and inevitable.  
 Anxiety and mortal trances.  
 Fear and tendency to run away.  
 Mind as if mad, indifferent, as much for agreeable and disagreeable things.  
 Wakes up as if from sleep everytime he is disturbed.

### GRAPHITIS

Weakness in the evening, alternating with gait in the morning.  
**Great disposition to sorrow; SPECIALLY** in the evening..  
 Sadness, sometimes with **thoughts** of death or with melancholia and tears.  
 Great tendency to weep hearing music, or with irascibility in children.  
 Excessive anxiety, which forces him to run here and there with sweats and nausea.  
**Tremblings** of the whole body, with headache, **vertigo** and bad humour.  
 Apprehensive anxiety for the fear of a MISFORTUNE sometimes with heat in the face and cold hands and feet.  
**Anxiety** as if he is going to die.  
 Restlessness and **inconstancy**.  
 Anxiety while working in a sitting position.

Wants to kill his parents, put fire on the house; eight men can hardly stop him.  
Mental weakness and anxiety.  
Extreme agony in the evening, as if he is lost, with sadness leading to suicide.  
Thinks to leave his profession, for the fear of being disfigured.  
Extreme irritability, wants to remain alone, thinks of the future with fright with the fear of being disfigured by a woman.

### APPREHENSION ON THE HEALTH OF HIS RELATIVES.

Very much hypochondriac.  
**Cross-grained temperament**, does not like TO LOOK AT HIS RELATIVES.  
Very much displeased and discouraged because of the pain he feels.

### HYOCIAMUS NIGER

Sadness with moroseness.  
**MELANCHOLIA.** Restlessness, even extreme, moves from one place to another.

**SCRUPLES OF CONSCIENCE. REPROACHES HIMSELF.**

Fear with tremblings and convulsions.

Great disposition to become afraid very strongly and stubbornly.

Fear of being poisoned.

Great impatience, believes to be lost when he has to face the least thing.

He believes himself very strong and very healthy, which he is really not.

When angry great force is developed.

The patient passes day and night completely NAKED and putting out cries.

Alternate fury and calmness.

Insensibility, apathy and idleness.

Feels no need EXCEPT THIRST.

Insensibility to pinching and stinging.

Complete loss of sense and reason, stupor, and *complete loss* of consciousness. Cannot recognise his own people.

Deprived of all senses, he sits on the bed, immobile like a statue.

**Solemn** gestures.

Violent **gesticulations** with his hands.

Dyspnoea.

**BURNING HEAT, CONTINUAL BURNING HEAT OF THE BODY.**

The **head is empty** of thoughts and **fixed look** in front of himself, stupidity, insensibility and idleness.

**Hebetude**, sometimes with continual somnolence.

**Imbecility**, is seen in his speech and actions.

**Very great activity.**

Loquacity, speaks more than ordinary, in a very strong

manner and precipitatedly.

**Divagations:** The patient is talkative and divulges things that a sensible woman will keep to herself throughout her life.

Imprecations, quarrels, rows, reproaches and complaints about imaginary injustice.

Tendency of being offended and injures others.

He raises his hands against others. He throws himself on the others with a knife in hand.

He wants to strike and assassinate every one he meets.

Jealously.

Cruelty.

Impertinence.

Slowness.

Inaptitude for arts.

Tic of chewing the nails.

Jealously of a man towards a woman.

Jealousy of a woman towards a man.

Eyes very much protruding.

Suffering after fright.

Sufferings after a fit of jealousy.

Tic to draw the chin or the heart.

Tic to become **STARK NAKED WHILE AWAKE.**

Insomnia of mad men: Hyose, then Bellad.

**IGNATIA AMARA**

Impossibility to make him speak or to enliven.

Fixed look in front of himself as if absorbed in his thoughts

He avoids to open his mouth and speak.

Defies himself, thinks everything is lost.

**Thinks that he cannot walk or move.**

**HOPELESS OF CURE.**

Morose and discontented, often because of a pain in the head.

Sorrow for the death of a dear one.

Sorrow for the loss of a situation or fortune.

Ign., Puls., Rhus., Calc.c.

The least thing exasperates him, makes him cry or weep.

Tears and sobbings when anything is refused to him although very mildly or if one does not yield to his caprice.

Great indifference and apathy for everything.

Restless activity. The patient undertakes sometimes one thing, sometimes another.

Tendency to become hasty, sometimes with stupidity.

**Precipitation** of desire, specially with **tendency** to speak, to write and to do everything sooner than one can do it, which causes him to make mistakes when **speaking, writing** and **doing anything**, and unceasingly make faults.

Very **delicate character**, very **soft**, and **sensitive**.

#### DELICATE CONSCIOUSNESS.

Very bad temperament which is painted on his face.

Changing mood, sometimes angry and carried away by the least occasion, sometimes mildness and tranquility.

Sense of giddiness, as if by an embarrassment in the occiput.

Attack of the loss of memory, with the loss of all senses, and is afraid of falling down.

Delirium day and night.

### LACHESIS

Mental weakness, sometimes with short breath and chilliness.

Melancholic mood (with sighs and complaints – Nux), better after having taken breath.

Repugnance to conversation.

**Anxious enquiries.**

Great tendency to griefs because of which he sees everything in its black side.

Tendency to DOUBT everything.

**Discouraged and depressed.**

Anxiety, cannot find rest in any place, wants open air.

APPREHENSIVE ANXIOUSNESS while going in a carriage.

Great heat on the head, as if from rush of blood.

Fear of DEATH, is AFRAID OF LYING DOWN, he is afraid of an ATTACK which will cause his death.

Great anxiety for his disease.

Is afraid at night, is afraid of being attacked by cholera, by thieves.

Disbelief and suspicion.

Believes to be offended by everybody. The most innocent facts are odiously interpreted.

Great dispute.

**Insane jealousy**, in the evening.

TENDENCY TO DOUBT EVERYTHING even for the TRUTH for which he was enthusiastic.

Ennui (Solubilis).

Great indifference.

Idleness and dislike for work, sometimes with moroseness or with indifference and weakness.

Dislikes any movement.

Very idle minded with bodily weakness.

Weakness of the mind and irresolution.

Tendency to find faults of others, and reproaches them.

Quibbler and tendency to quarrel for the sheer love of contradiction.

**Passionate and anger**, even without being contrariated.

**Wickedness and perfidy.**

Weeping mood with CHILLINESS even BY THE SIDE OF FIRE.

Sobblings and tears.

He is grave, calm, imperious, arrogant, majestic, even when he is angry.

Sorrowful mind.

A kind of weakness caused by intellectual fatigue.

Apprehension of a grave disease.

Tears and sobblings, at first about the past happenings and then about future.

Weeping and HOPELESSNESS.

Has no confidence on himself.

Very **timid** character.

Fear of fantastic images in the evening.

INVOLUNTARY weeping which do not console.  
Great tendency to tears.  
Great anxiety for which the patient can neither remain standing nor lying.  
He is as if **mad**, or as if he has committed a **great crime**.  
Extreme anxiety at night, from evening to morning, forcing him sometimes to get up and sometimes to lie down making walking difficult and unbearable.  
Restlessness and anxiety that chases him away as if for the apprehension of a misfortune.  
Continual anxiety and **restlessness**.  
**Sweats in the hands** and heat in the face.  
Great anxiety at night, with boiling of the blood.  
During the attack of distress, disgust for all works.  
Apprehension on his health and of those whom he loves. (also Hepar).  
Fear of LOSING REASON.  
Fear of DEATH.  
Great tendency to become afraid in the evening.  
After a simple surprise, extreme **fright with tremblings of the body**.  
Paralytic weakness, heat that rises up to the right cheek.  
Red blue swelling of the face, fatigued nerves.  
EXTREMITIES AS IF BRUISED.  
**Swaying of the knees** and the need for lying down.  
Indifferent for everything, even for eating (Staph.), although he can eat easily.

Great indifference, **serious mood**, with the tendency to become angry SEEING the manner of others.  
Such a weakness after a stool, that if he walks a few steps he will fall unconscious, with sweats.  
Indifferent for the most agreeable things, dislikes everything even the music.  
Repugnance for jokes and conversation.  
**Morseness** and **anxiety** as if for the fear of misfortune.  
Mood, MOROSE, LACONIC, SERIOUS.  
(1. Rhus 2. Solubilis 3. Amm. carb).  
**Tendency to dispute**, quarrels to and specially TO BE REASONABLE everywhere.  
IRRITABLE, ANGER  
Languishing nostalgia.  
Irresistible tendency TO DO LONG JOURNEYS.  
**Hasty when speaking**.  
Derangement of drunkards.  
DOES NOT KNOW WHERE HE IS.  
Loss of consciousness and of speech with imperceptible pulse (Carbo. veg.), face like a dead. Later on the speech returns later than reason.  
Distraction during which one idea chases constantly an other, and the thinking is always interrupted by other thoughts than thoughts about the subject concerned.  
Great **tendency** to tears.  
During WALKING, IRRESISTIBLE desire to take the passersby by the nose.  
He makes the room hot during the heat of the summer.  
The patient UNCOVERS himself at night (Puls.)

 "Great sadness with indifference for everything; disgust for everything. Irrascibility, morose and susceptible mood, tendency to make reproaches and to quarrel, violent anger for nothing followed by prompt repentance. Irresolution. Great distraction: every interruption disturbs the sequence of thoughts. Blunt mind. Does not know what he wants, nor what he does. A kind of madness with unreflected words, but with good mood and great hilarity.

### NATRUM CARBONICUM

Occupied only with sad thoughts.  
 Weeping mood throughout the day with ENNUI and sensation of being ABANDONED (Mercurius).  
 Always thinks about the future, with gloomy thoughts and desire for solitude.  
**Anxious** for himself.  
 Anthropophobia and horror of society, with timid character.  
 Attack of anxiety and restlessness with the fear of not being able to do anything successfully.  
 Imprecations and blasphemies, because of pains in the limbs persisting from 3 a.m.  
 Phlegmatic mood.  
 Ennui with self-centredness.  
 Dislikes business affairs and loitering although he can work successfully.  
 Apathy and want of interest.  
 Fatigued nerves.  
 The least event makes him fatigued and makes a strong impression with the sensation of weakness.  
 Discontentedness and desolation.  
 Bad humour with restlessness, irascibility and dissatisfied with everything.  
 Resentment with malvolence.  
 No respect for his relatives.  
 Violent, trembles and kicks.  
**Dissatisfied** and tendency to become angry with desire to strike everybody.  
 ANXIETY FOR THE FUTURE. HOPELESSNESS.  
 Great disposition to become angry.  
 Cannot **bear contradiction**, desire to beat and **quarrel**.  
 Becomes **VIOLENTLY** angry at the least occasion, and **SPEAKS** with **vehemence**.  
**Becomes completely exhausted** when he becomes angry.  
 In the evening after meals, great disposition to sing, to hum.  
**AWKWARDNESS** and **impossibility** to come to the end of easy things.  
 Difficult understanding while reading and listening to.

### NATRUM MURIATICUM

Affliction.

Affluence of disagreeable IDEAS, about old offences.

No confidence on his own ability.

Continual palpitation.

Continual disposition to look for disagreeable happenings of the past in order to afflict himself.

When he is alone, he is lost in his ideas and weeps.

The patient believes that everybody complains of him and weeps.

Consolation **causes** tears.

The patient is for some entire hours absorbed in sad thoughts about his **future**.

**Anxious** cares and restlessness for the **future**.

Completely discouraged and hopelessness.

Fear of losing reason or of DEATH.

He often sees himself in the mirror and imagines to have bad look.

Attack of anxiety with beatings of the heart, as if he has committed a crime.

**GREAT INDIFFERENCE AND WANT OF INTEREST IMPOSSIBILITY TO ENJOY.**

Dry in his MANNERS.

Laconism.

The patient replied only with disgust.

**IDLENESS and horror of PROLONGED WORK.**

He is disposed of nothing and **WOULD LIKE** to sleep.

Inspite of the horror for work, he likes meditation seriously.

Want of *independence* (after Calcarea).

Great irritability.

After a fright in the evening, the limbs are as if paralysed, then **terror and fearful apprehensiveness**.

JOKES offends.

Cannot bear contradictions in the evening with irascible mood and is easily offended.

He avoids society, because he foresees that he may offend others.

**WICKEDNESS AND ANGER.**

The least thing makes him angry and easily becomes heated.

**HATE AGAINST PERSONS WHO HAVE OFFENDED HIM** (after Calcarea, Vivus, Nux and Staph).

Even unimportant things make him laugh till tears come out.

Alternate gloomy lassitude with lightness of the limbs with gaiety.

**Awkwardness** which causes him to knock down everything. He lets fall everything from his hand (Nux and Staph).

He cannot remember what he was about to write.

Forgets proper names.

### NITRI ACIDUM

Want of *serenity* and *sadness*, as if he is OPPRESSED.

He cannot free himself from his sad thoughts.

Nostalgia.

Weeping mood, easy emotions.

The child cries much at the little scolding.

Very gloomy mood with ANXIETY.

Sadness and anxiety in the evening after menses.

Illusion as if he is loitering.

He is absorbed in his thoughts regarding **sad events** and cannot free himself from them.

Susceptibility.

Scruples of conscience.

Frequent attack of **anxiety** with great oppression **during** the whole day.

**THE BODY IS COLD AND TENDENCY TO FALL DOWN.**

Anxiety as if he has undergone and should undergo through a legal case.

Anxiety during storm.

Restless on his health.

**OVEREXCITATION.**

Disbelieve his own ability.

Discouraged and hopeless sometimes to the highest degree.

He imagines to **WISH** death soon.

Disgust for life, sometimes with dissatisfaction.

**Pleased with nothing.**

**Want of interest.**

Laconism.

He doesn't like to speak nor does he like to be spoken to.

CONCENTRATION during sorrow.

**Displeased** with himself, ending in **abundant tears** which consoles him.

Great impatience, in the **afternoon**, with sadness, obstination, anxiety and restlessness. He finds rest nowhere.

IRASCIBLE which fatigues his nerves after a dispute, tremblings of the whole body.

The least **bagatelle** makes him so much heated that he laughs at himself.

Attack of fury or hopelessness with OATHS and IMPRECATIONS.

Idea of rancour because of business.

Stubborn **rancour**, **insensibility** to excuses and demands for pardon.

Changing mood, sometimes gay, sometimes sad.

Great weakness of memory, gradually as the weakness of the body increases.

He understands with difficulty what he hears as if he is hard of hearing.

Head without any thought, as if he has lost his consciousness.

## NUX VOMICA

Physical and mental irritability.

Timid, anxious, inconsolable.

**Silent mood, self-centred.**

Internal vexation.

Wandering gestures.

Loses the knowledge about places and of houses.

Weakness and moroseness.

Sweats in the forehead during colics, as if caused by an internal heat.

**Apprehension** as if there is a **fear of misfortune.**

Irresolution and fear.

Restlessness and lamentations which forces him to walk much in the open air.

**TIGHTNESS IN THE CHEST, SENSATION OF GIDDINESS**, in the evening while walking.

Great anxiety in the afternoon, as if by the APPREHENSION of a misfortune.

Fearful cares and suspicious specially, in the afternoon.

Dreams of cats and cars.

Vertigo as if the bed turns upside down.

SUICIDAL MOOD and disgust for life.

Great weakness of the mind.

Insomnia at night and somnolence during the day.

The attack of ANXIETY is followed by abundant sweats.

Easily afraid with giddiness as if from drunkenness.

Seeing a vexatious thing becomes immediately afraid, which attacks his limbs and the body which almost make him unconscious (Staph., Phos).

**Desolation.**

Reproaches with red and hot cheek.

Trembles every moment as if he is suffocated by some mucus in the throat (Staph. + Bryonia).

Hypochondriac mood.

Specially after meals and towards evening, he complains of fullness in the abdomen and lassitude as if he has eaten much.

Hopeless of cure (Vivus).

When vexed he always says, "My God!" (Hydrocephale encephalitis).

Similarly when he is aggrieved.

Fear of DEATH AND BELIEVES HIS DEATH IS NEAR.

Hours, specially in the morning in bed, pass extremely slowly.

He looks at the clock every instant and is surprised to see the hands have moved so little.

Thinks about his will.

Very great sensitiveness to all impressions.

Noise, conversation, strong light, strong smells (Caust) are unbearable.

Everything is FELT very strongly.

Every step, the least jerk are **painfully** felt and are unbearable.

The pains are tolerated with great **wailings**, with **moanings**, **reproaches**, **quarrels**.

He believes that his present pain is unbearable and desires to do away with his life.

**Inconsolable** mood, with tears, moanings, and lamentations with the **TOP OF HIS VOICE**. **Reproaches**, **quarrels**.

He cannot tolerate anything, not even the least illness.

He weeps **when** he is contradicted by the **mildest** way.

Weeps, and noisy moanings.

**FROWNS** and **CROSSES HIS ARMS**.

Weeping, irascibility.

Dislikes conversation.

**OPINIONATIVE AND OBSTINATE OPPOSITION** in everything that the others desire.

He cannot bear the least **contradiction** nor the **remonstrances** the most reasonable without losing control of himself.

Irascibility, quarrelsome, he is offended by everything.

Great disposition to criticise and to reproaches.

Injurious out of jealousy, with shameless expressions, quarrels and reproaches.

Quarrelling mood, comes to blows.

Carried off by violent anger.

He looks at everybody with a wicked eye, as if he wished to whip him.

**MILD CHARACTER, EXCESSIVE TENDERNESS, SENSIBILITY AND CORDIALITY.**

Music makes him tearful.

Ennui, time seems to pass very slowly.

#### Pure and clinical indications

While Ignatia is indicated in men (specially women) who have tender and delicate conscience, who concentrate their emotions and are tormented incessantly by them, with alternate hilarity and tears, Nux vomica is indicated in men (specially in men) who express themselves violently, but internally they are greatly impressionable, sad, weep, groan, sob, blame, reproach, quarrel, injure, anger up to blows, stubbornness (their impatience to tolerate contrariety and contradictions), attack of jealousy with obscene words.

Ennui, pessimism, hopeless upto suicide.

Nux vomica seems to act very rarely in tender, easily afraid, defiant, meticulous, scrupulous, undecided, anxious and taciturn persons.

It is indicated in men (accidentally?) awkward in everything having aversion to work, who are unfit for intellectual works, distracted, aphasic, quarrelsome and caustic, meticulous, scrupulous.

— In people (specially men) after a grief, affection, loss of fortune or one of his relatives, with spasms, convulsions.

---In those, who have the above mentioned symptoms, use habitual coffee and wine.

Plus 6 obs. of HER MEL.

Plus 6 obs. of Dulac.

#### OLEANDER

Sadness and want of confidence in himself, with disgust for everything and stupidity.

Displeased and irascibility.

Cannot bear contradiction.

 Temerity, anger, fury, ferocity, cruelty by opium in strong doses.  
**Consecutive symptoms:** Increase of hilarity and beatitude in ideas takes the place of unreason and of demence.  
 Sadness, taciturnity, weakness, discouraged, easily frightened, tremblings, anxiety, want of will power, inconstancy, cowardice.

### Intellect

Abundance of ideas with hilarity. The mind is alert and more fit for serious activities.  
 No desire to sleep, surprising exaltation of the imagination and of the memory; he passes the whole time in meditations. Ecstasies up to magnetic clairvoyance.  
**Consecutive symptoms :** Weakness of the mind, of memory; stupor, stupidity, delirium, demence sometimes furious, idiotism, hallucinations.

### Pure and clinical symptoms

Opium may cure patients having the primitive symptoms and the patients having actually the consecutive symptoms, if

the latter were preceded by the primitive symptoms.

The same thing may be said about the somatic symptoms which are consecutive, which constitute almost all the pathogenesis of Opium. Thus for example, the physical weakness, moral and intellectual weakness of drunkards, in whom there was an inverse overexcitation caused by the alcoholics.

According to Hahnemann a moderate dose and weak doses produce : Primitive effects.

Exaltation of irritability and of activity of voluntary muscles.

Diminution of the excitability and of the activity of involuntary muscles.

Exaltation of imagination and of courage.

Depresses, stupefies the external senses, the general sentiment and the conscience of himself.

#### **Consecutive effects**

Want of excitability and of the activity of voluntary muscles.

Morbid exaltation of the involuntary muscles. Absence of ideas, dull imagination with cowardice and hyperesthesia of the general sense.

In very high doses, Opium produces some primitive effects and more intense consecutive effects, which are sudden and mingles themselves and are confounded.

Opium is almost the single remedy which does not cause any pain during its primitive action. The latter consists in complete extinction of the sensibility, followed, as a consecutive effect by greater sensitiveness to pain and to all other senses and to sensation.

Opium is therefore the only remedy which cannot cure in a durable manner any pain, except when the latter is symptomatic of a morbid state to which Opium is homoeopathic, as for example the opinionative constipation caused by *Plumbum* or the dysentery caused by a retention of fecal matters in the upper intestines. The mind is awake and more fit to serious occupations. Cessation of the desire for sleep, surprising exaltation of the imagination and of the memory in such way that he passes the whole night in sublime meditations. Ecstasies leading to clairvoyance.

#### **Consecutive symptoms**

Weakness of the mind, of the memory, stupor, stupidity, delirium, demence, sometimes furious, idiotism, hallucinations.

### **PHOSPHORUS**

Great tendency to moral emotions.

**Concentration.** Affliction.

Bad mood during TWILIGHT, following many evenings at the same hour with anxiety and pusillanimity.

The world seems to be unbearable, **only tears** console him with indifference and apathy as consequences.

Anxiety with heat in the head, hands are hot and red, with **OPPRESSION AND TIGHTNESS IN THE HEART**, with anxiety about his illness and for the future.

Palpitation and **tremblings** of the whole body.

Greatly **anxious** during **storms**.

Great overexcitation and irritation.

**Capricious susceptibility.**

Head as if drenched with hot water.

Every word of another seems to be very important and makes him pusillanimous.

Every bagatelle puts him out of himself with anger.

Very greatly impressionability of all the senses, specially the sense of smell.

Great moroseness, with idleness and bad mood.

Becomes very much angry for a simple thing.

Heat in the face with palpitation.

Nausea and complete loss of appetite.

Stubbornness. Misanthrop.

#### **Tenderness**

Every thing seems very much clear and **gay** with the sensation of a soothing heat throughout the body.

Shamelessness, take off his dress, and wants to walk completely naked.

Great indifference to everything, even for his children.

She **BELIEVES TO BE A GREAT WOMAN OF HIGH RANK**, and can administer important businesses.

## PHOSPHORI ACIDUM

Anxiety for the future makes him **anxious, miser and disgusted** of his life.

Excessive solicitude for a child and thinks that he will lose his sight.

Tendency to **make reproaches** every morning for ten days.

He is tormented by some ideas of hatred and vengeance, for the reason of expenditure.

**Rancour and hate.**

Mental restlessness, calmed by walking in the open air.

Deep melancholy, anxiety about his country, about his affections.

Fear of falling ill with anxiety for the future.

**Weeping** mood as if by **nostalgia**.

Distress as if the chest is very narrow with internal heat.

**Restlessness**, causing to stop any work with **THE FEAR OF FALLING ILL**.

Anxious researches, continually **for his illness**.

Precipitation while speaking and cannot have anything soon.

He cannot master his **great irritation**.

Oppressed mind, body broken down.

Continually displeased, sometimes **silent mood** and **dislike** for conversation.

He speaks rarely and replies only with unwillingness.
